Edited from Bishop's *A Set of New Psalm Tunes in Four Parts* (2nd edition) (London 1722) (BL A 1230 e). Bishop gives only one verse; verses 2-5 have been conjecturally added. His strophic settings are usually tenor led. This one appears exceptionally to be soprano led. This may be the earliest printed example of a relay tune, with the four voices singing an unaccompanied phrase followed by the last two lines of the verse repeated in chorus.
